Crandall Park restroom project is complete

Thanks to a 2024 fall grant from the Regional Development Authority a bathroom has been built in Crandall Park this year. This park is located at S. 2nd Street and Spring Street.

The City received a \$20,000 grant from the Regional Development Authority to help with this project. The Eldridge Park Board will be picking up the remainder of the cost.

The bathroom is handicapped accessible and can be reached from additional sidewalks com-

pleted by public works staff. In past years the City has had to use porta-potties to serve citizens at this location.

This is a welcome addition as the shelter at Crandall Park is a popular place to host birthday parties, anniversaries, family reunions and other events throughout the year. The shelter received a new roof this summer as well. The shelter can be reserved at https://cityofeldridgeia.org/departments/parks-rec/. The park is also the home to

many T-Ball games throughout the summer. The diamond there went through an extensive remobeling in 2023.

The bathroom features LED lighting, a water heater for the sink and a stool and urinal. It has a concrete slab outside of the door with a sidewalk connecting to the city walk.

Construction started this summer and was recently completed.





A permanent restroom is now complete in Crandall Park thanks to a grant from the Regional Development Authority. This project was recently completed along with a new roof at the shelter in this park. This shelter is available for event rental.

Meet your new City Clerk!



Caring for your Stormwater Pond: Tips for Businesses and HOAs

Stormwater ponds play a crucial role in managing runoff in our community, protecting neighborhoods from flooding while helping filter pollutants before water reaches our streams and rivers. For businesses and homeowners associations that own these ponds, proper maintenance isn't just about appearances. It's essential for function and may be required by city ordinances.


Many pond owners face common challenges that need ongoing attention. Excessive algae growth, often appearing as green scum on the water surface, typically results from nutrient-rich runoff containing lawn fertilizers. To combat this, consider fertilizing upstream lawns less frequently and using soil tests to apply only what's needed. Another frequent issue is geese congregation, which can lead to messy shorelines and poor water quality. Creating a buffer of taller native plants around the pond discourages geese, who prefer short turf grass and open sight lines. These native plantings also help filter pollutants and provide habitat for beneficial wildlife.

Regular maintenance ensures long-term pond

function. Schedule periodic inspections to check for trash accumulation, eroding banks, or clogged outlets. Many communities organize upstream cleanup events to prevent litter from reaching the pond. Remember that our city requires stormwater pond owners to conduct annual inspections and maintain proper function. Failure to do so could result in costly repairs or potential fines. For guidance on pond maintenance requirements or native plant selection, contact the city's stormwater department. With proper care, your pond can be both a community asset and an effective part of our stormwater management system.
